Interview Corner

- One of her memorable moments was playing Swiss Team event at the tournament in January run by Luke Danielson.
- Another memorable moment came more recently when she received Master Points at the Pro-Am game in April thanks to two great partners: Cleveland Fleming and Dick Czarnecki.
- Her goal for Unit 116 is to try to achieve and to somehow establish better rapport between the duplicate clubs

Personally:

- She and her husband Jim have been married 54 years and have two sons and two daughters; three of which live locally. She also have six granddaughters and one grandson.
- She taught first and second grades for 27 years mostly on Grand Island retiring in 1994.
- Her "claim to fame" was in long distance running which became a main focus in her life starting at the age of 46." "I travelled throughout the US many times as an invited runner and was #1 in my 5-year age group several times. In 2005 I was inducted in the US Masters Hall of Fame."
- Her interests are: playing bridge, volunteering at the SPCA, playing the violin in the church orchestra, belonging to two book clubs, and active in the Methodist church on Grand Island.

The editor interviewed a polite, courteous and helpful patriarch in the Bridge community. His name is **Jim Mathis.**

• Jim started playing auction bridge with his parents and grandmother at about 8 years old.

- While in the Navy, Jim got hooked on contract bridge.
 - He started playing duplicate while at UB.
 There was a duplicate game on campus on
 Thursday evening directed by Agnes Gordon.
 - Jim twice won the Intercollegiate pairs.
 Tournament with Frank Poleszak and Fred Bellinger.
 - Jim served on the Unit Board for 9 years in the 1950's and ran several tournaments.
 - During the years 1959 1987 he had to balance time between family and required commitments in his banking career.
 - He started attending Nationals in Washington 1961 (never more than one per year) ending in Philadelphia 1996 mostly with **Bob Freedman** where they received national recognition.
 - He had the 4th and 8th best records from 1966 1974 and qualified for 2 Olympics. Not like today, where it takes only money to go.
 - The two people who helped Jim most were Al Roth and Edgar Kaplan.
 - He served on the National Board of Appeals giving countless hours to adjudicate wrongs
 - After he retired in December '86, he served one more term on the Unit Board and 3 yrs on the National Board of Governors
 - He is also one of slightly over 300 people who get to vote on Hall of Fame candidates; kind of a farce as the National Board with their (2) special awards get to put in whomever they want.
- He loves the game of bridge but is disenchanted with the way the league is going. In his opinion the league is in the business of "selling" Master Points to support the Juniors and those interested in International competition.
- He's proud of the fact that he appears in numerous newspaper columns; bridge books by Kelsey; Accolades from Edgar Kaplan, competition in the Bridge World Challenge the Champs (last Crane & Fisher).
- With regard to the question of his goal for Unit 116, Jim's response is "in the foreseeable future Unit 116 will continue to have the problem of – "fragmentation".

- Jim has been married since 1950; has two daughters and five grandchildren (14 through 18 vrs)
- He has donated about 8 gallons of blood.
- He is an avid college and pro sports fan with baseball, his favorite

Bidding:

2♦ 2♠ (new suit forcing)

3♠ 6♠ pass

The opening lead was a small \clubsuit , and I won it with the $\clubsuit A$. I drew trump by cashing the $\clubsuit A$ on the board, returning to my hand with the $\clubsuit Q$, but then I discovered there was a 4-1 split (West discarded). When East got in with their $\clubsuit J$, they should have led clubs back to their partner but instead they led a \blacktriangledown , so I made the contract…but I know I should have gone down.

I have a couple questions:

- 1) Did I bid the hand properly? Should I have bid 6♦ instead of 6♠?
- 2) Should I have somehow known to play the hand for a 4-1 trump split and finesse for the ♠J?

How did I not think this hand through properly???

First of all, thank you so much for sending in this hand! © It will give other newer/299er players a chance to learn from it as well. Please do not feel embarrassed! Learning how to handle strong hands takes time, and developing proper suit play techniques takes even longer. Hopefully you'll gain a few "tidbits" in this article Bidding After talking with you, you said your partnership agreement for opening a Weak 2 is having "2 of the top 4 honors." After partner opens 2♦, you should "know" partner has ♦QJxxxx for the bid since you have the other 2 top honors in your hand. This is good information! You have a solid ♦ fit. However, duplicate players are a greedy bunch (ADMIT IT! ⊕), and we try to play in major-suit contracts when possible since we can earn a higher score than in minor-suit contracts. Thus, your bid of 2♠ is 100% perfect! Bidding a new suit (♠s) after partner's Weak 2♦ is forcing for another round, and when they raise to 3♠, that should be music to your ears! Your jump to 6♠ is too fast though. Did you think about using Blackwood to check for the missing A?? Partner will show it, and actually you should bid the grand slam of 7♠, especially with such a strong side suit (*s) that can be used for discarding losers.

Declarer Play Sometimes a hand needs to be "deconstructed" into a suit-by-suit analysis. In this case, you should be thinking this: can you *guard* against a bad trump split (in your case, 4-1)? Yes, you can...IF East is the hand with 4 trump. If West holds 4 trump to the ≜J9xx, you have no play for it (think about it from the defensive view of *covering an honor* (your ≜10) with

an honor (their ♠J). Instead, if East holds 4 trump, you have a *finesse* position (that ever valuable ♠10!).

Holding $\triangle Ax\underline{x}$ in the dummy, the *best* and *safest* way to play this suit is to begin with the $\triangle K$, and then later lead low over to the $\triangle A$. West will discard on the 2^{nd} round of trump, and East will be marked with the remaining $\triangle J$. If spades were 3-2, you will be fine anyway, but playing the suit this way will *guard* against East having $\triangle J$ 9xx.

TO BID...OR NOT TO BID ...Game. That is the Question

One of the most difficult bids to make is in response to your partner's invitational 3-heart, 3-spade, or 2-no trump bid. Do you want to risk going down while trying for game, or should you settle for a safer partial-score? All the information you are going to get probably has been transmitted. Now, hurry up! Bid game or pass! This study focuses on the results when the same hands were bid to game by some partners while others passed in favor of a partial.

Of the 368 travelers reviewed, 137 (37%) had contracts played at both 3- and 4-hearts, 3- and 4-spades, or 2- and 3-no trump. Not only was the bid to be made a vexing one, but also a surprisingly frequent one. The 137 boards produced 233 contracts just short of game and 476 contracts at game. It may be concluded from this that bridge players are about twice as bold as they are shy.

Looking at the 233 partial contracts, 68% were successful. Out of 476 game contracts, only 53% were achieved. The mere 15% difference in favor of the conservative sub-game contracts was unexpected. We thought the difference would be greater.

While 233 contracts were bid below game, 91 (39%) resulted in enough tricks for game. When broken down by contract, this was the result:

Achieved game contract (or better)

3-Hearts 3-Spades 2-No Trump 34% 36% 56%

The difference in the percentage between the no trump and the majors is statistically (p=.01), and open to several interpretations which will be addressed later in this report.

The scores achieved by the various contracts provided another perspective for analysis. The average score for each contract level was calculated with both positive and negative scores combined and are shown in Table 1.

Table 1 shows that those partnerships pushing on to game, - despite a higher percentage of defeats – ended up with an average score about three times higher than the partial score average.

The final analysis was to compare the rankings of the partial versus the game scores. The ranking of all scores on the 137 travelers were calculated. The 3-no trump scores averaged a .73 higher rank than the 2-no trump scores. However, the scores for 4-hearts and 4-spades averaged only a .38 higher rank than the 3-heart and 3-spade scores. Pushing on to game was in the final rankings almost twice as favorable in no trump as in the majors.

Based on the current and previous studies by these investigators regarding no trump contracts^{1,2,3}, the following findings are corroborated:

- 1. Of all contracts, a 3-no trump has the highest rate of success (approximately 74%);
- 2. The contract with the highest degree of overtricks is 3-no trump (approximately 72%);
- 3. When the same hands are played in 3NT versus 4H or 4S, the 3-no trump contracts scored higher 57% of the time;
- 4. Contracts which stopped at 2NT made game 55% of the time, as compared to 34% and 36% for 3H and 3S:
- 5. Game contracts, despite going down at a higher rate, resulted in scores three times higher than sub-game contracts;
- 3NT scores resulted in final rankings that were twice greater than the rankings of the major contracts when compared to their respective partial contracts.

Why do so many contracts stop at 2NT when 3NT has such favorable outcomes. Current conventions and standard bidding systems as presented in virtually all bridge textbooks would account for this practice. Start the bidding by looking for an 8-card major fit. When the fit does not materialize, 2NT often becomes the contract by default if "textbook points" (26) seem lacking. Findings here suggest that the bidders seek a no trump fit first. At the three level, more bidding space would exist to follow-up for a fit in the majors. A system of bidding "stoppers up the line" would keep the bidding level low enough to still arrive at a 4H or 4S contract for hands lacking stoppers in all suits.

If in doubt, - bid game! There is more to gain by the risk.
