The Bridge "Gene-ie"

Hello everyone, and welcome to the first article of a local bridge column devoted solely to answering questions from newer and intermediate players! First, let me introduce myself. My name is **Eugene Harvey**, and I am an ACBL-certified Bridge Teacher. I've been teaching at The Bridge Center for almost 4 years now, but I've been playing bridge for much longer. (Ahh how time flies!) I've thought about doing a bridge column locally for quite some time now, and I can think of no better opportunity than the present to volunteer some "teacher time" to all of you puzzled players!

If you are a novice or intermediate player, please feel free to email me (see below) any bridge-related question, and your question might be the one selected anonymously for the column! I'll do my best to respond to emails whenever possible...

To get the column started, let's use an emailed question from a student in one of my classes: "Last night's lesson was great! Also, in what situation do I need 18 points to bid 2NT? It came up last night, and I think I misled my partner..."

When you have a balanced hand with 18 to 19 High-Card Points (HCP), you open 1 of a suit and later plan to *jump-shift* to 2NT. A jump-shift by the opener shows a very strong-hand, and a jump-shift to 2NT is no exception. In fact, it shows a very specific point range. Over time, you will find it easier to remember what I call "The Notrump Structure." Let me walk you through it:

12-14 HCP = open 1 of a suit and plan to rebid 1NT (or cheapest NT available)

15-17 HCP = open 1NT

18-19 HCP = see above

20 to 21 HCP = open 2NT

22 to 24 HCP = open a Strong 2♣ first, then plan to rebid 2NT

25 to 27 HCP = open 3NT

With more than 27 HCP, CALL ME IMMEDIATELY! Obviously you're lucky and I want to play with you right now! (Actually, there are bids to handle those very rare stronger hands, but I'm running out of column space!) The key to NT ranges is to memorize (yes, memorize) your 1NT, 2NT, and 3NT openings, and then anything outside those ranges should pique your curiosity and hopefully "spark" a memory of the Bridge Genie's NT Structure.

I hope I've granted you your first wish! Now it's your turn to email me some questions... Please contact me using the email address below. Good fortune to you all!

From **Eugene Harvey**, we received this excellent soup recipe:

Cream of Tomato Soup

4 T. butter, halved into 2 T. each (I substituted olive oil for half the butter, thus 2 T. of each)

2 - 28 oz. cans diced tomatoes, drained with 3 cups of the juice reserved

1 - 14 oz. can diced tomatoes, drained (optional)

1 medium onion, chopped finely

3 cloves - garlic, minced

2 T. dried basil

pinch - ground red pepper or cayenne pepper (optional)

1/4 cup light brown sugar

1 T. tomato paste

2 T. flour

1 3/4 cup (1 can) chicken stock

1/2 cup heavy cream (but I used half-and-half)

Pepper to taste (be careful of using additional salt - the tomatoes and stock already have sodium)

- Melt 2 T. butter in stock pot or Dutch oven over medium heat. Add drained tomatoes, onion, garlic, brown sugar, and tomato paste. Cook, stirring occasionally, until the onion and garlic is softened and the tomatoes begin to caramelize (about 15 min.).
- 2) Puree mixture in food processor or blender until smooth. (may have to do it in batches)
- 3) In same pan, melt remaining 2 T. butter and stir in flour (roux). Cook 1 min. or until golden. (If roux clumps, add 1 T. olive oil to loosen it.) Return puree to pan and stir with the roux.
- 4) Stir in broth and reserved tomato juice, scraping up the bottom of the pan. Add dried basil. Bring to a simmer and cook for 10 to 15 min. (If desired, add additional smaller can of diced tomatoes for chunkier soup.)
- 5) Stir in cream and return to a brief simmer, then remove from heat. Season with pepper to taste before serving. Serve with croutons or crackers

Garlic Asiago Croutons

3 T. olive oil

2 garlic cloves, minced (OR 1/2 t. to 1 t. garlic powder)

1 t. salt

1 t. pepper

4 c. bread cubes (preferably at least day-old stale, sturdy bread)

1 c. shredded Asiago (or parmesan) cheese

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

- 1) Cube bread if not already done. In a large bowl, whisk oil, garlic, salt and pepper. Using your hands, toss bread cubes in oil mixture until evenly coated.
- 2) Add cheese and toss well.
- 3) Spread cubes onto a baking sheet and bake until golden, about 20 to 25 min.
- 4) Let croutons cool to room temperature, and then gently break apart if cheese has caused them to stick together. Serve in soup or salads.

It's All In Your Mind By **Dick Czarnecki**

Did you ever hear your partner say that in a moment of frustration? You just said "The Bridge Gods are just against me! How else can you explain our 22% game?"

Maybe it's not in your mind, the fault may be in your brain. Did you know that scientific research indicates that the brain shrinks by a ½% each year after the age of 30.

If you accept the statistic that the average Duplicate Bridge player is 68 years old, that's a lot of shrinkage going on.

However, the brain really is an electrical circuitry buried in fat. The synapses in the brain continues to grow at a speed determined by intensity of brain activity. You build a lot more synapses playing Duplicate Bridge, researching an article, learning a new language than watching "Law and Order."

To compound the problem for couch potatoes is the reptilian part of your brain. **Dr. Martha Beck** in her book "Steering by Starlight: Find Your Right Life No Matter What" says:

"The inner reptile is the most primitive part of us, it is also the deepest layer of the human brain. The only function is to broadcast aversion and fear signals. It will keep you running toward things that will save you and away from things that are dangerous at the exclusion of everything including your own happiness."

Dr. Beck also says:

"On one hand our reptilian brain is convinced that we lack everything we need. We don't have enough love, time, money, everything. On the other hand, something terrible is about to happen to us."

So not only are our frontal lobes vanishing, which is where we store memories, we are in a constant state of anxiety.

Can't you just see yourself saying to your partner "I knew something horrible was going to happen but I didn't remember why." Then you fill out the traveler and ask: "Down four vulnerable, that's 1100 isn't it?"

Maybe the answer is getting in touch with the 90% of the brain we are not using. But that's a myth! We really are using all of our brain all the time or maybe misusing it would be a better word.

Nature has an axiom that is true "Use it or lose it." So shake off your reptilian alter ego. Stay positive. If we think we will fail, we will behave that way.

The Bridge Gods did not cause you to lose. Read a good book on defending or declaring. Play up. Get outside of your comfort zone. Play against tougher opposition. Imitation is the sincerest form of flattery. Find out what makes good players good and use it against them to get better. You will help your memory circuits to grow and keep your reptile buried deep in your brain dungeon. It really is not in your mind, it's in your hands.
