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Interview Corner



The editor interviewed Carl Stone. a friendly person who is always willing to help:

Bridae:

- He was introduced to contract bridge by a family friend from New Jersey when on summer vacation in 1957.
- He still has "Goren's New Contract Bridge Complete" from that year.
- He didn't have much of a chance to play again until his sophomore year in college. He never had any formal lessons.
- His introduction to duplicate bridge was at a Sectional event north of Boston in 1961. That was scary, with opponents yelling at

each other and frequent director calls. Because of the intimidation, He didn't return to duplicate until 1965, playing then at a local club in Westboro, MA.

- He was married in 1967 and though playing social bridge occasionally, gave up duplicate bridge for the next 35 years. Diane and he moved to the greater Buffalo area in 2000. After several years,, he was running out of things to do in retirement. His wife suggested that he try a local duplicate game sponsored by the Wheatfield Seniors. His addiction returned in a hurry playing in Wheatfield, then at the Niagara Falls Senior Center and LaSalle Yacht Club.
- He enjoyed playing with Ed Rutkowski, a wonderful and patient partner. He played frequently against Nancy Kessler. Impressed with her style and feeling that they had met somewhere before (a likely story!), they tried playing as partners and seemed to click. When Ed passed away in 2005, Nancy became his primary partner and they have enjoyed playing ever since.
- Among other people, he enjoys playing with Eleanor Whelan, Paula Kotowski, and Alfred Haber. All of the folks with whom he has played have the same traits... intelligence, kindness, and humor. He found the same to be true of the many people with whom he has yet to play.
- He notes that his less memorable moments are directly related to sub-sub-50% games.
- He served for one year on the Unit Board of Directors, and on the election committee for the elections in 2007 and 2008.

Personally:

- He grew up outside of Boston and went to college there. He has been married to his wife Diane for 41 years. Diane plays social bridge only.
- They began their marriage in the Hudson Valley where he worked for IBM as a technical writer and systems programmer for 30 years
- He was active in athletics (volleyball, basketball, softball), the volunteer fire department (corporate officer and line officer), and local politics (to a minor extent).

- They have two children and 3-1/2 grandchildren. Their children graduated from college in Buffalo and stayed here to work.
- After retirement, he and his wife Diane moved here to be close to them and their families.
- He enjoys cabinetmaking, gardening, electrical work and house design.
- His current passion remains duplicate bridge, playing with terrific partners.

Bridge:

- Dotty was first introduced to bridge by a girlfriend many years ago when her kids were small. They continued to play together until her first grandson was born. She told her girlfriend she'd be interested in playing bridge, but didn't know the first thing about it and her friend taught her the basics and she stayed at that level the whole time, enjoying a social bridge game with friends.

- Besides Ken, she enjoys playing with many different people including Helen Panza, Betty Dorio, Walt Olszewski and Nan Denn and others. She enjoys playing with someone new.
- Dotty has played at different Regionals, mostly with the same team members. Enjoyed watching each became Life Master and celebrating their accomplishment. This was a goal she didn't think would be possible.
- Dotty would like to see Unit 116 build more community among the various clubs. There are so many wonderful people and it would be great to see less bickering and more togetherness and support for our Unit games.

The Bridge "Gene-ie" By **Eugene Harvey**

Hi Eugene! Here's a hand for you:

<u>North</u> Q 5 4 3 Q A 5 2 K J 7 4 3

Dealer South A K J 9 2 9 7 2 K 6 A Q 5

We dealt it at random, and explored opening bids of 1 and 1NT. It appears to be cold for six spades, but how can you get there? We can get to 4 or 3NT. The latter is disastrous! Best regards!

Thanks for the question! Holding a GOOD 5-card major AND a maximum hand (17 HCP), the best way to open this hand is 1. You should *upgrade* the value of this hand to 18 pts. due to the 5th card in the good \triangleq suit. People opening 1NT probably will get to 4. via a Stayman auction, but they will miss the slam.

Assuming you open 1♠, I have the perfect solution for this hand...and those people in my former class on Major-suit Raises might recognize the perfect bid too, right?? ☺ *wink*

With 4+ card trump support, values of an opening hand, and an outside void or a singleton that is not an Ace or King, you can make a Splinter bid, which is a double jump-shift to the short suit. Never heard of it? Take some time to research it – Splinters are not too difficult to understand, and they can be VERY useful indeed!!

1♠ - 4Ψ (!) = Splinter (Alertable) 4+ card spade support, singleton or void in hearts, about 12 to 15 support points total, no wasted values (A or K) in the splintered suit

After the splinter, the opener knows that he will be able to trump most of his losing hearts in the dummy since dummy will have a singleton or void in hearts. Also, the points in the responder's hand should tend to be in the outside suits – not in the splintered suit – so the rest of declarer's honor cards are "working," so to speak (honors in ♣s and ♦s will "fit" nicely with responder's values in those suits).

Here's the suggested bidding then:

<u>Critical Thinking – Bidding Inference</u> Since the responder should not Splinter with a singleton $\forall A$, the Blackwood response of 5 (showing 1 ace) <u>must</u> be the $\diamond A$ (you have the 2 black aces). This is a great piece of information! It covers your \diamond loser. Things are looking much better between the hands!

Declarer Play

12 tricks should be relatively easy to take... The easiest way: pull trump, then start *unblocking* your ♣ suit by playing the ♣A, then the ♣Q, then the ♣5 over to dummy's winners. Then you can *discard* 2 of your 3 ♥ losers on the remaining ♣ winners. Voila! A small slam made! ©

Haunted Surroundings By **Bob Noe**

Amherst - Daemen College - <u>Curtis Hall</u> - It is said that two brothers had gotten into a fight, and had hung themselves at the same time on separate sides of their home in Curtis Hall. People have felt the presence of these two brothers, and say that the brothers have tried to play tricks on the people who visit and work in Curtis Hall. They will move chairs around, and tie knots in your shoelaces.

Batavia - *Tonawanda Creekside North* - On the north side of the Tonawanda, in the City of Batavia, lays the old Pioneer Cemetery. It was moved more than seventy years ago to the center of Batavia because of a flooding problem. When the creek flooded, it would sometimes wash up a body or two. It is believed that not all of the bodies were relocated. There now stands a number of businesses where the original cemetery once was. People claim to this day of seeing a mysterious woman in gray walking along the Creekside.

Buffalo - *Buffalo Naval Park* - The S.S. The Sullivan's - This ship was named after the five Sullivan brothers who were killed in WWII on the same destroyer. Roycroft Pavilion - The Roycroft Pavilion is the home of the Aurora Players. Many of the cast members have felt a presence or seen strange things. The ghost is said to be that of a middle aged dark haired woman

Fredonia - Fredonia State College - <u>Igoe Hall</u> - A student named Jimmy Igoe was killed on a fishing trip to Lake Erie. He now haunts the halls of this structure by slamming doors, changing television channels, turning lights on and off, and messing with the water in the bathrooms and he messes with the elevator. When you ask him to stop, he will.

Grand Island - *Holiday Inn* - in the holiday inn there is a room that is all locked up. This is be-

cause whenever someone rented that room, they got a call in the middle of the night at the same time and when they picked up all they heard was a little girl laughing.

Whitehaven Cemetery - A young girl who haunts the Holiday Inn next door her grave stone glows. There is also a young woman who died of AIDS in the early 1990's there and she can be seen on her grave marker holding her infant son. There is also a man who died in the Gulf War walking around. He is supposedly looking for his pregnant wife

Lockport - *Cold Springs Cemetery* - A young hitchhiker still comes to the place she was picked up and murdered.

Kennan Center - Strange white lights, and apparitions seen.

Kennan House - A little boy ghost has been seen running and playing throughout the house.

Old House - There is an old house across from a bar in Lockport. It was a house that was involved in keeping slaves during the Civil War and was part of the Underground Railroad. There was a massacre there, where everyone was killed. A few years ago someone bought it to restore and make into a museum but the men rebuilding it kept getting very scared by ghostly presences on the site and in the house. They left their scaffolding there and never came back. If you go near the house at night you can see black figures guarding it.

Newfane - Van Horn Mansion - A man named James Van Horn built this mansion in 1820. His wife died at the age of 21, some say under mysterious circumstances. A roofer almost fell to the ground after he saw a woman looking at him out of a window of the empty house. Carpenters fled when a person materialized out of a cloud in a bedroom. They wouldn't go back even to get their tools. Some motorists have tried to avoid a girl running from the mansion, and then vanished.

Niagara Falls - *Niagara gorge* - Devils hole -Down by devils hole, just underneath the famous haunting of Clet Castle, Niagara University, there are mysterious apparitions, foreign language cants, and sometimes the feeling that someone is watching you or simply just brushed you gently as they passed you by. The light never really does seem to shine fully on this long decent of stairs. and many locals will not go down there at night, not because of crime, because people here are very trusting. It is just a given knowledge.you don't want to go there. A few summers ago a couple of fishermen found bones of a young Indian warrior (perhaps), or from a young Indian boy thrown down to the gorge, possibly for sacrifice.

Niagara University - <u>Clet Hall</u> - Clet Hall has burned down multiple times, resulting in numerous deaths. One ghost is of a student who died in a fire. Many students have claimed to see his ghost inside their dorm rooms and in the adjacent theater.

Orchard Park - $M^*A^*D^*S$ - There is believed that a spirit named Ronald inhabits this very old building. It used to belong to a man named Ronald, and the kids that now go to this dance studio, firmly believe there is some kind of super natural being in the studio. It likes to play tricks, for example; hiding the cds, and misplacing glasses, and other cruel jokes.

Old AirPort - At night you could hear howling and people talking in the office building. Update: The story of the ghosts ended about a few months ago. The airport was destroyed to make way for new apartments.

Tonawanda *Elmlawn Cemetery* - At night orbs can be seen, when driving by this cemetery. A number of unidentified lights as well can be seen inside the cemetery as well. This normally occurs between midnight and 3am.

Elmlawn Cemetery / Church - years ago, a young woman was just married to the love of her life in that church. As she was crossing the street to go in their "get away carriage", she was run over and killed instantly by an oncoming carriage. It has been said that you can still see her cross the street after dark!

Mighty Taco on Eggert Street - The cooler in the back, and surrounding areas outside the cooler by the dumpster is said to be the home of an unexplained presence. Workers will at times be in the back, back section, in the freezer, when they feel a sudden sense of danger, and a hurried need to get out. Similar unnatural feelings have occurred by the dumpster, right outside the cooler. It is not certain the reasons for this, but nevertheless the feelings remain, unexplained.
